As you see on the back side of this page, all AP Language Q1 prompts have the same title page. You will need one as well. The "directions" section is always the same so you can copy that or skip it, but you will need:

1) Introduction – informational overview of the topic under consideration. Generally, you identify at least two perspectives on the topic (normally in opposition). See your AP Language exam folders on CD-R you got in English class...

2) Assignment – focus or narrow the scope of your essay assignment and THEN write the "Write an essay in which you..." sentence. This is the most important sentence (or two) of this entire activity (see the bold, underline example below in 2013 or check the other following examples).

3) List of Sources: for Sources A-C you can choose how you divide short articles that are a)

objective/neutral/informative; b) pro; c) con. Also, consider getting sources from clearly legitimate sources (NY Times, Wall Street Journal, Time, etc) and some from very weird places (personal blogs, , twitter post, letters to the editor, etc) or at least from a non-traditional media form (Huffington Post, internet, a transcript from a radio interview or TV show). See below for info on Sources D, E. YOU CAN CHOOSE TO HAVE MORE THAN 5 SOURCES (since AP sometimes gives 6 or 7). Include author name or identifying information in parenthesis next to source letter like AP does. Label your Sources (A-E) when you attach them after your title page.

D – must have a statistical source (pie chart, bar graph, Excel file, an infoblurb, etc)

E – must have a visual source (cartoon, drawing, photo, etc)

4) Your actual 5 (or more) sources. Most sources will be one page, but none should be longer than 2 pages.

2013 = The need to memorialize events or people is complex; in some cases, monuments honor moments of great achievement, while in other cases, monuments pay homage to deep sacrifice. A monument's size, location, and materials are all considerations in planning and creating a memorial to the past. Then, in a well-organized essay that synthesizes at least three of the sources for support, examine the factors a group or agency should consider in memorializing an event or person and in creating a monument.

This question requires you to synthesize a variety of sources into a coherent, well-written essay. When you synthesize sources you refer to them to develop your position and cite them accurately. Your argument should be central; the sources should support this argument. Avoid merely summarizing sources.

Remember to attribute both direct and indirect references.

Introduction

Mass public schooling has traditionally proclaimed among its goals the following: (1) to help each student gain personal fulfillment and (2) to help create good citizens. These two goals—one aimed at the betterment of individuals and the other aimed at the betterment of society—might seem at odds with one another. At the very least, these two goals are a cause of much tension within schools at every level: schools want students to be allowed or encouraged to think for themselves and pursue their own interests, but schools also believe that it is right in some circumstances to encourage conformity in order to socialize students.

Assignment

Read the sources that follow (including the introductory information) carefully. Then choose an issue related to the tension in schools between individuality and conformity. You might choose an issue such as dress codes, mandatory classes, or the structure of the school day. You do not have to choose an issue that you have experienced personally. Then, write an essay in which you use this issue to argue the extent to which schools should support individuality or conformity. Synthesize at least three of the sources for support.
